

Wyoming Libraries Join Arch Coal Teacher Awards Program

Wright, Wyo. (July 19, 2005) – Wyoming's libraries will become a partner in the Arch Coal Teacher Achievement Awards program in the coming school year, Arch Coal Vice President Greg Schaefer announced today.

"Arch Coal is delighted to have the Wyoming library community join it in recognizing the state's top classroom teachers," said Schaefer. Libraries will now post information about the program. The teacher recognition program asks the public to nominate teachers either by mail or over the Internet. All state libraries have Internet access.

Each year, Arch Coal provides each of 10 recipients a \$2,500 personal, unrestricted cash award.

"It is Arch Coal's way of saying thank you for doing such a great job with our children," said Schaefer. "Over the past five years, Arch Coal has honored 50 excellent classroom teachers in Wyoming."

The Governor's Office, Department of Education, Wyoming Education Association, Taco John's and Loaf 'n Jug also are partners in the program.
